Campus Housing

Residence Halls

Our eight traditional residence halls house primarily first-year and sophomore students in single, double, and triple rooms. Each residence hall offers a main lounge area, smaller floor lounges, kitchenette facilities, study rooms, laundry, exercise equipment, and vending services. Seven of our residence halls offer suite-style living where four to eight residents share a common bathroom. One residence hall is corridor style where each wing of a floor shares a bathroom. All students living in the residence halls are required to be on the unlimited meal plan. Regardless of age, all residence halls are drug and alcohol free facilities. Students can also choose to live on special interest housing floors.

Our residence halls are supervised by Area Coordinators (ACs). Each floor in our residence halls has a Resident Assistant (RA).

Apartments

Our two apartment villages offer housing to primarily upper-class students in two, three, four, and five person apartments. Each fully furnished apartment has an appropriately equipped kitchen, common space, and shared bathroom facilities. Students living in the apartments are not required to be on a meal plan, but may choose from various meal plan options available.

Our apartment villages are supervised by an AC. Each neighborhood in our villages has a Unit Assistant (UA), whom is an upper-class student with past RA experience.

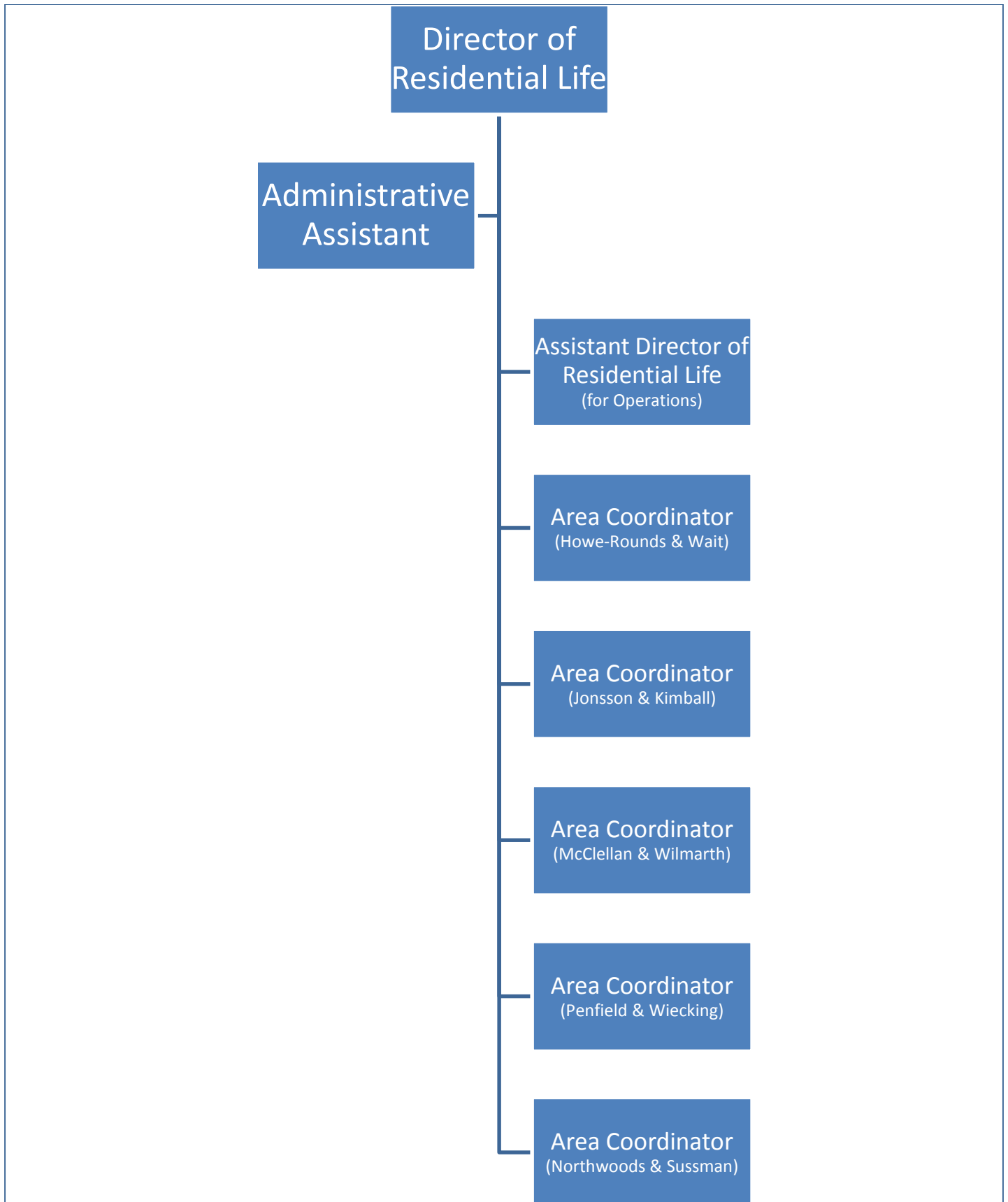
Off Campus Living

Skidmore has a commitment to supporting the educational philosophy embedded in the importance of living in campus housing and therefore guarantees on-campus housing to all full-time students. However, recognizing that some may want to experience off-campus living, Skidmore college permits Junior and Senior standing students to forfeit their housing guarantee and select to live off campus through the annual Housing Selection process.

With few exception, full-time First-Year and Sophomore students are not permitted to live off-campus and are required to live in college-supervised housing. Exceptions to this policy may be made in the following situations: students living with a parent and/or guardian and commuting daily, students who turn 22-years-old before the start of the academic year, married students, students with children and students with approved medical/physiological based accommodations to live off-campus. All part-time students may be permitted to live off-campus.

Area Coordinator (AC) Job Description

SUMMARY

The role of the Area Coordinator (AC) is that of a liaison between the Student Affairs Professional Staff, Unit Assistants (UAs), Resident Assistants (RAs), and residents. The AC is a live-in member of the Office of Residential Life Team and, as such, is expected to subscribe to the professional standards and philosophy of the Department of Student Affairs and Skidmore College. The AC serves as a role-model offering assistance and direction to UAs, RAs, and residents.

The AC is concerned with the growth and welfare of each individual and the group as a whole, living on-campus, in order to assist students in adjustments to group living and campus life – providing support and resources as necessary. They create an atmosphere in the residence halls, apartments, and on the campus in general, conducive to self-direction, academic achievement, social/cultural maturity, and self-discipline. The AC promotes civic, ethical, and professional responsibility.

SPECIFIC RESPONSIBILITIES:

1. Serve as an official representative of the Office of Residential Life, Department of Student Affairs, and Skidmore College.
2. Interpret and enforce College rules, regulations, policies and procedures.
3. Oversee a residential area, insuring within reasonable measures, the physical safety and welfare of the residents.
4. Maintain a presence in an assigned residential area to stimulate the growth and development of students.
5. Supervise, train, and evaluate the RAs/UAs in assigned residential area.
6. Facilitate a weekly team meeting with assigned RA/UA team.
7. Hold bi-weekly one-on-one meetings with assigned RA/UA team.
8. Coordinate all residential area openings and closings.
9. Maintain accurate residential area records including, but not limited to, rosters, room changes, room inspection forms, work orders, programming forms, and budgets.
10. Advise and support RA/UA team with the residential education model.
11. Adjudicate Student Conduct cases as assigned.
12. Outreach to students living in your residential area on an informal basis throughout each semester.
13. Coordinate and perform ancillary role(s) in the Office of Residential Life (*i.e. Residential Education, RA/UA Training, RA/UA Selection, Website, Team Recognition, Assessment, Student Outreach, etc.*).
14. Actively participate in Room Selection, RA/UA Selection, Professional Staff and RA/UA trainings, In-Service training programs, and Professional Development Opportunities.
15. Act as Area Coordinator on-call for the residence halls and apartments on a rotating schedule.
16. Report to the Director of Residential Life as their immediate supervisor.
17. Hold office hours in the Office of Residential Life.
18. Attend weekly Professional Staff and Student Affairs Division meetings as they are scheduled.
19. Meet with your direct supervisor for weekly one-on-one meetings.
20. Support all professional and student team members in the Office of Residential Life.
21. Work in conjunction with the professional staff to implement RA/UA training and in-service programs throughout the year.
22. Collaborate with different campus offices, programs, and initiatives.
23. Other duties as assigned by the Office of Residential Life.

Area Coordinator (AC) Job Description

GENERAL DUTIES

1. Assist students in transitioning to the College, its educational goals, philosophies, and traditions.
2. Advise and counsel students, within the limits of training and capability, on social and academic matters and/or make referrals when necessary.
3. Maintain confidentiality as necessary.
4. Help students develop a community atmosphere conducive to study and learning.
5. Be aware of attitudes and feelings of individuals and groups.
6. Promote and encourage individual planning and participation in the residential education model, College activities, and student organizations.
7. Afford general availability to students in your residential area.
8. Report conditions needing repairs and maintenance to the proper authorities.
9. Develop and maintain a cohesive student team.
10. Report symptoms of problem situations and all emergencies to appropriate office(s).
11. Report all emergencies to the Director of Residential Life and/or Student Affairs Administrator on-call.
12. Assist in the critical evaluation of office policies, practices, and procedures. Encourage innovation and facilitate change through the presentation of carefully prepared recommendations to appropriate supervisory personnel.
13. Familiarize yourself with College services in order to inform students and to make referrals when necessary.

MISCELLANEOUS

1. Read, and abide by the Room and Board agreement, with professional living exceptions approved by the Director of Residential Life.
2. Pets are not allowed.
3. Partners are allowed.
4. Utilize a landline telephone in apartment and provide contact information for emergencies.
5. Outside employment or any activity that may interfere with competent fulfillment of the responsibilities of the AC position must be approved by the Director of Residential Life.
6. ACs are held personally responsible for any and all damage self-inflicted to their assigned living space, as well as the behavior of any and all guests.
7. ACs must be aware of their surroundings and present a professional appearance and role-model positive behavior, including on campus, off campus, and online communities.
8. When employment ends, for whatever reason, ACs are expected to move out of their apartment and out of the building within the timeline designated by Human Resources, the Vice President of Student Affairs, and the Director of Residential Life.

Professional Development Opportunities

The goal of our professional development opportunities is to assist our Area Coordinators (ACs) with their personal growth and development in the field of residential life. This may be accomplished by staff members through continued enhancement of skills and competencies as well as networking opportunities. The Office of Residential Life (ORL) expects all staff members to search, engage in, and reflect upon his/her own growth and development.

The ORL is an institutional member of the Northeast Association of College and University Housing Officers (NEACUHO). As an institutional member, all staff members in the ORL are considered members of NEACUHO. It is expected that staff members make use of the benefits afforded to the ORL from NEACUHO membership during each academic year through any of the following ways: attending a district event, one-day drive in conference, or annual conference; reading or writing for *The Navigator* newsletter; submitting a question for or responding to a question on the listserv; presenting at a conference; participating on or chairing a committee or task force; chairing or acting as a site host for a conference; and/or working on the executive board.

ACs are expected to map out a plan for the year during the summer and review it with the Director. Examples of professional development opportunities past ACs have participated in, include:

- Membership professional organizations (*i.e. NASPA, ACPA, ACUHO-I, ASCA, etc.*)
- Attendance to locally sponsored or district events (*i.e. Fall Drive-In/NPC, MLI, Res Ops, etc.*)
- Attendance to a regional annual conference (*i.e. NEACUHO, NASPA Region II, CSPA-NY, etc.*)
- Attendance to a national conference (*i.e. ACUHO-I, NASPA, ACPA, etc.*)
- Skill building workshops (*i.e. Strengths Quest, FISH, Myers-Briggs Type Indicator, etc.*)
- Executive board or committee work
- Purchase of books

Additional support for funds, or re-distribution of funds, may be approved at the discretion of the Director as deemed appropriate. Additional funds are dependent upon the current year's budget and intentionality of growth (*i.e. chairing a conference, participating on an executive board, training institutes, representation of Skidmore College, skills growth as it relates to and benefits our office, etc.*).

It is expected that staff members are discussing their professional development plans with their supervisor throughout the year. Staff members are expected to keep a budget of his/her professional development costs (dues, registrations, food, lodging, etc.) on the provided professional development budget form. A copy of each staff member's final spent budget is due to the Director by June 1st.

It is expected that staff are cutting costs whenever possible by carpooling, sharing lodging, applying for scholarships, and intentionally seeking opportunities that will benefit their growth and development in the field of residential life. It is also expected that staff are adhering to the Skidmore College Travel and Entertainment Policies.

Keeping Fit & Active

Beyond Skidmore's sports center, YMCA, and Planet Fitness in Saratoga Springs, there are a number of ways to stay fit and active outdoors. Runners can enjoy over a dozen 5k races offered through the year, with annual 10k's and half marathons. Cycling enthusiasts can take pleasure in numerous bicycle routes in the city and surrounding country side, and off-road trails for mountain bikers. Within an hour's drive you can be at the trailheads to a half-dozen different hiking experiences at the foot of the Adirondack Mountains. Nearby Saratoga Lake and Hudson River provide opportunities for paddling. Skiers and snowboarders can reach over a dozen mountains within a two hour radius.

Live Sporting Events

From college D3 & D1 sporting programs, to minor league and farm teams, the area has a multitude of events to see within a forty-five minute drive. As an employee of Skidmore you can attend all home games for free, and the local D1 teams charge nominal fees. The American Hockey League has two local farm teams, the Albany Devils and the Adirondack Thunder. Also, the Tri-City ValleyCats are the farm team for the Houston Astros.
